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| Monitoring and Evaluation of PE across the school | <p>Teachsport worked with Eliot Bank to create assessments to focus on specific skills for each year group each term for both indoor and outdoor PE lessons. As well as the assessments tracking performance, we conducted pupil audits termly to assess the impact of the improved provision on attitudes and behaviour in / during sports.</p> <p>Further to this, we measured the number of children taking part in extracurricular sporting opportunities and encouraged - and continue to encourage - pupil premium children to take up as many of the opportunities available as they can.</p> <p>As a result of improved tools to monitor and evaluate PE, standards and participation in PE are better tracked. This data is used to shape next steps and targeted support is more focussed.</p> | Teachsport £500 |
| Increase Of Enrichment Clubs/Activities | <p>As an inclusive school, we provided opportunities for all children to participate in school sports.</p> <p>Our popular Get Active Club encouraged children to become more physically active and taught the importance of a healthy lifestyle.</p> <p>Pupil Premium children were invited to attend clubs and funding was used to offer a subsidised cost for all clubs.</p> <p>There were various opportunities for children with exceptional sporting talent, including talent identification screening. We utilised links in the community with Sydenham Lawn Tennis and Lewisham Thunder Basketball team. We also offered a Gifted and Talented sports club during the Spring term.</p> <p>Pupils in Years 6 were encouraged to apply for the schools Young Leaders programme. As Young Leaders they supported younger children to play games at break time. Year 6 children support KS1 and EYFS sports days, modelling the activities and guiding their younger peers. We have an extensive extracurricular sports programme.</p> <p>As a result of the improved enrichment opportunities in PE, more children – including those disadvantaged – have opportunities to participate in sports, in addition to the PE curriculum provision.</p> | See cost for inter-school coordinator. |

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| <p>Participation & Success In Competitive School Sports (Includes increased numbers of pupils participating in an increased range of competitive opportunities as well as success in competitions)</p> | <p>We had a boys' and girls' football team who participated in the Lewisham Football League at Blackheath on Saturdays.</p> <p>This year, we participated in an all-inclusive multi-skills competition to enable even more children to experience the fun of competitive sport. We provided release for teaching staff to take teams of children to the inter-school competitions.</p> <p>Our swimming team took part in a local swimming gala.</p> <p>We held three separate annual Sports Days for each Key Stage: an Early Years Sports Day, as well as a KS1 and KS2 event.</p> <p>We took part in three inter/intra school competitions, with every child taking part in speed bounce, skipping and chest push. Speed bounce required the children to jump side to side with feet together over an obstacle as many times as they could in two minutes. The skipping task measured the number of skips in the same time. For chest push, the children pushed a ball away from their chest and the distance it travels until it first bounces was measured.</p> <p>As a result of the increased opportunities to partake in competitive sports, more children are participating in tournaments, developing attributes such as ambition and learning how to win/lose graciously.</p> | <p>£1790</p> |
| <p>Curriculum</p> | <p>We have continued to employ specialist PE company Teachsport and Independent consultant Glen Burt to deliver high quality school curriculum PE. The funding has enabled us to support teachers through team teaching with these specialists to deliver PE, Gymnastics and Dance.</p> <p>The funding enabled the professional development opportunities for teachers and to improve the skills in PE, Gymnastics and Dance in the following ways</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Specialists team teaching with teachers • Staff INSET and training with these specialists • Focused teaching of groups in PE. The teachers at Eliot Bank worked alongside the coaches. We provided staff meetings for teachers to further develop their understanding with our providers <p>As a result of the employment of Teachsport and Glen Burt, CPD opportunities for staff have been plentiful and competence in delivering Quality First Teaching of PE has increased.</p> | <p>£12330</p> |
| <p>Partnership Work On Physical Education With Other Schools, Companies And Other Local Partners</p> | <p>Through our links with Lewisham sports coaches we have joined other local schools in a series of Lewisham Sports Festivals. These provided regular opportunities for high quality inter-school competitions in a range of areas, from basketball to inclusive multi-skills.</p> <p>As a result of our on-going partnerships, links with other organisations have been further established and children have benefitted from this through inter-school competitions.</p> | <p>Inter-School Coordinator £ 1400</p> |

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| <p>Review the impact that the funding has had on other factors Inspectors also take account of the following factor: The greater awareness amongst pupils about the dangers obesity, smoking and other such activities that undermine pupils' health.</p> | <p>At Eliot Bank, we value the importance that PE plays in our children's lives and success is celebrated at every opportunity, from children making progress in a class to teams winning at a tournament.</p> <p>As well as providing varied PE lessons, we offered children the opportunity to participate in sporting events and festivals which would otherwise be unavailable to them.</p> <p>Children are encouraged to reflect on next steps for improvement and good practice both in themselves and others, giving suggestions on how to move forwards.</p> <p>Teachers always model a positive attitude to health and wellbeing and during PE lessons children are encouraged to think about the importance of keeping healthy.</p> <p>At the 'Get Active' lunch time club, children developed an understanding of the importance of keeping fit and a healthy and balanced diet. This will establish good habits that will benefit the children in future.</p> | |
